

# THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

Music lovers are in for a treat Sunday when another of the series of "pop" concerts by high school musical and vocal organizations will be presented. The concert will feature the band, other musical units, glee clubs and other school vocal selections.

To those who have heard the band, the program will provide another fine entertainment. To others who have not had the opportunity of hearing it, it will provide a surprise. Under the direction of Prof. Rudolph Anfinson the development of the large 115-piece musical organization has been nothing short of phenomenal. The musical score he transmits to his proteges is indeed amazing. Likewise, the school has shown rapid strides in the development of other musical units and in the vocal units.

Necessity of additional funds, which it is hoped will be derived from this concert, is only secondary to the paramount theme. The fundamental purpose of the concert is to reawaken this city to music culture.

It behooves the residents of the city to attend the concert. Not only to attend, but to study the fine work and progress being shown by the high school organizations.

The support of the citizenry is necessary in this musical activity. That it will be worthwhile can be gauged by your reactions to the beautiful program arranged for the concert.

## MARITAL FIVE-YEAR PLAN--

The British have contributed the newest approach to the marriage and divorce problem. It is a bill, already passed by the House of Commons, prohibiting divorce until a marriage has been in existence at least five years.

The grounds for divorce may range from desertion to insanity and habitual drunkenness; but, regardless of the charge, it is the theory of this bill that every avenue of conciliation shall be exhausted before separation can finally be proposed. In a word, the law would force couples to make an honest effort to "live out" their differences.

Were this law in effect in America, the trade at Reno conceivably might drop. Moreover, the definite prospect of a five-year contract might tend to slow up the marriage mill in the beginning. So it is an interesting experiment the British are proposing. When they have tried it for a time, perhaps we might try it ourselves.

## SOIL CONSERVATION NEEDED--

As if to defy the Congress of the United States, with its new soil conservation program, withering dust storms already are sweeping the southwest, threatening new devastation unless spring rains halt their progress.

Millions of acres and billions of dollars of farm income hang in the balance. The "dust bowl" area of the southwest presents irrefutable argument for soil conservation, regardless of whether it carries benefits or rewards to farmers for participation. Conservation is a national necessity.

The Department of Agriculture cannot attack this vital problem too quickly. It is to be hoped that the vast size of the task will not slow up too greatly its administration.

The dust bowl area needs a start on soil conservation NOW.

## AGED MAN STRUCK BY AUTO IN CITY; INJURIES SLIGHT

Hans Anderson, aged Brainerd man, escaped serious injury this afternoon when he was struck by a Brainerd cab company taxi on the corner of Sixth and Laurel streets. He was taken in the cab to St. Joseph's hospital but his injuries were said to be confined to a severe bruising-up and nervous shock.

Anderson was starting to cross Laurel street south from the Ekk-building, when the cab backed around the corner as it was turned back from Sixth street due to fire hose stretched across that street.

The rear bumper of the cab driven by Keith Gillette, struck Anderson and carried him back several feet before the machine could be stopped. The wheels of the cab, however, did not pass over his body.

He was picked up by several witnesses to the accident and taken to the hospital by Gillette. Two passengers were in the auto when the mishap occurred.

## EXPECT ANOTHER WITNESS TO NAME TOUGHY AS LEADER

Minneapolis—William Barry, a former member of the "Terrible Tommy" Toughy gang, went on the witness stand at Toughy's trial today, and was expected to identify the ailing bandit leader as a participant in a rail robbery of the Milwaukee depot in 1933.

Barry, serving a prison term on another charge, was brought here by the government as one of the witnesses against Toughy.

Earlier today a machine gun and a sawed off shot gun said to have been used by the bandits were displayed in court. The weapons were found in the Cannon river south of here.

## BANK OFFICIAL IN JAIL IN DETROIT TRUST FUND THEFT

Detroit—James J. O'Shea, vice president of the National Bank of Detroit, was lodged in Milan federal detention farm today, charged with aiding Harry M. Tyler, assistant city budget director, in misappropriating \$349,000 in city funds.

O'Shea, federal officers charged, aided and abetted Tyler by putting his "O. K." on checks withdrawn from city trust accounts deposited at the bank.

His arrest followed the restitution of \$130,000 in cash and stock, which had been secreted in a safe deposit box in the name of a third party.

Charges were lodged against O'Shea after a week-long investigation by city and federal authorities. The inquiry was the immediate cause of Tyler's suicide last Thursday.

The men, in solitary confinement since last August, sawed bars from their individual cells and one of them had succeeded in squeezing through the small opening when they were discovered by Carl F. Walters, a guard.

The prisoners were Wayne Waggoner, serving 17 years from McCook for automobile theft, and Tom Hall of Lincoln, serving life for murder.
